This event was held on April 19, 2014 in Racine at Memorial Hall. The event was held by the Veterans of America Motorcycle Club (VOA). The concert was located on two different stages located on the main floor and downstairs. They were invited by the VOA to place a table at the event to answer questions about the program and to show where some of the proceeds were going to benefit. 100% of the proceeds from this event go back into helping veterans in the community. This includes VAP. The VOA throws a Christmas Party, a 4th of July cookout and comes out a few times a year to just cook out and hang out with the residents. Recently they donated a residential refrigerator to the facility to replace one that no longer worked in one of the pod areas.

CULTIVATING A LASTING PARTNERSHIP

With one main goal in mind, "Assisting Veterans in need", several organizations from Minnesota and Wisconsin got together on February 14, 2014 to speak about their programs and discuss collaborations. The attendees consisted of several different levels of professions including Case Managers, Social Workers and Directors. The meeting was a great representation of the different services in Wisconsin and Minnesota that aim to assist Veterans.

Kathleen Vitalis, President/CEO of The Minnesota Assistance Council for Veterans (MACV) discussed her program and the different ways they are able to assist Veterans in the state of Minnesota. MACV provides comprehensive programs and supportive services to homeless veterans in three primary focus areas: housing, employment and civil legal concerns.

Don emphasized the need to build rapport and lasting partnerships with other organizations in order to serve our Veterans in the most effective ways possible.

Mary also discussed the ICAA's Connections Store which allows them to assist families and individuals with food, clothing, job training, medical needs and funding for emergency housing.

Greater collaboration between agencies and the need to improve interagency working is a key priority in providing effective services. The meeting was a great way for the different organizations to network and put a face to a name. We can only hope that our partnerships will build lasting results in assisting Veterans in need.
